

What was done?	Professor Danilo started the meeting and welcomed everyone present, he explained the structure of the seminar which includes a time for reflection and questions based on the literature for the week. Duduzile and Carolina presented a report of the previous session. The report can be found in the shared Google folder. Professor Emil Sobottka shared a presentation "South Africa and Brazil: Colonial Heritage and Decoloniality as Challenges for Education". Professor June spoke about her book, <i>Ausi Told Me (2021)</i> and South Africa's unique history and framed the current decolonial work within this context. A great deal of light was shed on various colonial contacts (Portuguese, Dutch, and British) and the subsequent Afrikaner nationalist oppression in the form of Apartheid. There was time for comments and questions before the session was concluded.			



	 Professor June reminded us to turn off our video cameras as much as possible to help the seminar participants who may be having a connection problem.
	• Be mindful of academic language and where each participant may find themselves. Sometimes the language can be alienating, reimagine ways to bridge the various gaps.
	• Meeting recording is an issue, as not readily available which makes reporting and the subsequent archiving a bit challenging but not impossible. Carolina is trying to sort out the recording download problem.
	• The reporting structure that Duduzile and Carolina created is helpful and a great starting point. Working in pairs organised representatives from both countries (Brazil and SA) which is vital to get to know each other and effectively promote a South-South dialogue.
	 Suggestion: for all participants (South Africa and Brazil) whose first language is not English and who may struggle to fully express their ideas in English, be allowed to talk or write in their language of choice. Perhaps someone could interpret on their behalf.

	• A Google doc was created where participants could share their thoughts on the readings. In this way, we can build a collaborative document.
