PHOTOGRAPHIC INFORMATION Photographer's Name: (The person who presses the shutter)

Camera make & model: Try and give as much information as possible including lens focal lengths (e.g. Canon 6D with 24-105 mm zoom lens).

Camera Height: Distance from the ground to the middle of the camera lens. Use a tape measure.

How has the site been marked? Rock cairn usually, but also say if the site has not been marked at all.

Notes on weather conditions: Sunny, rainy, cloudy, hot, cold, windy, etc.

The information in the table provides a general guideline for the number of photographs that you need to take at a site. If you need to take more then do so. It is important to remember to take a photograph of the tripod position. One picture should be of the tripod's position in the general location (e.g. from about 5-10 metres away) while the second photograph of the trip is of the position of the legs and is from a few metres away only.
